Study Island is a webbased software program that provides tutorials, instruction and practice questions to students on an individual basis. To use the software program each student logsin to their personal account. Students work at their own pace through lesson plans designed with New York State curriculum standards. "One reason this program is excellent is because it is linked directly to the NYS math curriculum and it is a great resource for preparing our students for NYS standardized tests" explained Ms. Magee.

#### **Students Learn About Internet Safety**

During an assembly on Computer and Cyber Security high school students learned about "Julie's Journey". Julie was thirteen when she developed a friendship with a male on the Internet. Their relationship soon turned into something more personal and after just several weeks of talking on-line, Julie ran away from home to meet her cyber-friend. She never knew the person she was talking to on the Internet was really a 56-year old convicted felon. After leaving home it took authorities three weeks to find Julie and she hopes her story will alert teenagers to this and other potential dangers on the Internet.

Following "Julie's Story" students learned about cyber bullying, how to recognize it, and how to react if they feel they are a victim of cyber bullying. High School Business teacher, Ms. Esposito, also reminded students about the importance of choosing good Internet passwords. Once a password is chosen, they should not share it with friends or classmates. Students were also provided safety tips for blogs and social networking sites such as MySpace and Facebook.

#### **Middle School Students Learn About Respect**

Students in grades six through eight attended an interactive assembly with FFA President, Kenneth Quick. The assembly focused on teaching students about respect and the importance of earning respect by giving it to others. Mr. Quick challenged students to earn respect in their lives by using the three actions of seeing, stepping up and setting.

First, you must see how you look in the eyes of others. Act respectfully at all times because there is always someone judging you by your actions. Second, we must step up and accept challenges. The more we challenge ourselves the more respect we will earn from others. And third, we must set a positive example for those around us. Always act as a role model for others, show them respect and you will earn it in return. Students were engaged and excited by the content of the presentation.

#### Information on New York State's New Child Restraint Law

Beginning November 24, 2009 New York State is requiring that all children be restrained in an appropriate child restraint system while riding in a motor vehicle until they reach their 8<sup>th</sup> birthday. An appropriate child restraint system is one that meets your child's size and weight recommended by the manufacturer. The safety belt in your vehicle is not designed for children. A booster seat raises your child up so that the safety belt fits your child correctly and provides better protection.
